If you miss a second September 1st deadline, the penalty will be \$700.00.

If you miss a third September 1st deadline the penalty will be at the maximum of \$1,500.00.

If you pay a penalty, any younger foals out of that same broodmare will be covered under that penalty.

Wascallywittlewabbit Risks Win Streak in Sunday's \$50,000 Zia 870 Championship



Rogers Farms' Wascallywittlewabbit (pictured) will put his three-race win streak on the line in Saturday's 870-yard, \$50,000 Zia 870 Championship Stakes (R) at Ruidoso Downs.

Wascallywittlewabbit was the champion distance horse during the Remington Park spring meet, as the 6-year-old son of Heza Motor Scooter scored victories in the 870-yard, \$50,000 Pauls Valley Stakes (G2) on April 1, and the 870-yard, \$64,000 Remington Distance Championship (G1) on May 29. The gelding has won eight of his 13 starts at the 870 trip and five of nine at Ruidoso Downs.

Wascallywittlewabbit drew post 3 and will be ridden by Benito Baca for trainer Mike Joiner. His five opponents include Why Buy The Cow, a 6-year-old Heza Motor Scooter gelding trained by Clint Crawford. The runner-up to Wascallywittlewabbit in the Pauls Valley, Why Buy The Cow prepped for this race with a wire-to-wire, 1 1/2-length victor in an 870-yard, \$20,200 open-condition allowance for New Mexico-breds at Ruidoso Downs on July 24.

Why Buy The Cow drew the rail post and will be ridden by Cerapio Figueroa.

Bella Dona (pictured) and Mark's Warrior — both stakes winners during the Ruidoso Downs summer meet — will make their next starts in Saturday's 6-furlong New Mexico State Fair Thoroughbred Futurity (R) trials at Albuquerque Downs.

An undefeated daughter of Attila's Storm racing for Robert Driggers, Del Rae Driggers, and Ben Lee Ivey, Bella Dona will be stretching out in distance off of her wire-to-wire, 4 1/4-length victory in the 5 1/2-furlong, \$125,000 Rio Grande Seniorita Futurity (R) for state-bred 2-year-old fillies at Ruidoso Downs on August 15. The filly has won all three of her starts and has earned \$75,929.

Bella Dona is one of five winners from as many starters produced by Charlotte's Drone, an unplaced daughter of the Full Choke stallion B.G.'s Drone, and she is a full sister to three-time stakes winner Tilla Cat and a half to stakes winner Lariat. The homebred filly drew post 2 and will be ridden by Jimmy Ray Coates for trainer Simon Buechler in the second of two trials.

Mark's Warrior is a homebred son of the Bernardini stallion Marking campaigned by Dale F. Taylor Racing and trained by Todd Fincher. The gelding has banked \$66,533 from four races, and he broke his maiden with a come-from-behind half-length score in the 5 1/2-furlong, \$116,000 Rio Grande Senior Futurity (R) for New Mexico-bred colts and geldings at Ruidoso Downs on August 15.

Mark's Warrior is a half brother to 2020 Mountain Top Futurity (R) winner My Storm Warrior. The gelding drew post 3 and will be ridden by Alfredo Sigala in the second heat.

The first heat is headed by morning-line favorite Lonzo Who, a homebred stakes-placed son of the Indian Charlie stallion Comfort trained by Todd Fincher for owners Sam E. Stevens and Sammy L. Stevens of Lamesa, Texas. Lonzo Who is coming off of a Ruidoso Downs summer campaign during which he banked \$36,581 from four starts and ran second, 1 1/4 lengths behind winner Marked, in the 5-furlong, \$124,000 Mountain Top Futurity (R) on June 26.

Lonzo Who is one of four winners from as many starters produced by the winning Not For Love mare Weekends For Love, and he is a half brother to 2020 Manzano Stakes runner-up Jonathan Who. The gelding drew post 3 and will be ridden by Rodolfo Guerra.

The first trial also drew Maurcenia Cross' Emmys Silver, a homebred Mr. Trieste filly who scored a come-from-behind, one-length victory in her career debut, a 5-furlong, \$20,000 maiden-special-weight race for New Mexico-bred 2-year-olds at Ruidoso Downs on August 13. Emmys Silver is one of four winners from five starters foaled by Silver Stairs,

a daughter of the Mr. Prospector stallion Demidoff who won two stakes for Illinois-breds at Hawthorne Racecourse near Chicago in 2008, including the \$106,700 Lady Hallie Stakes (R).

Emmys Silver drew post 2 and will be ridden by Luis Colon for trainer Gary Cross.

The top six finishers from each trial will meet in the September 19, \$200,000-est. New Mexico State Fair Thoroughbred Futurity final.



Rex Wells' Bigg Dee (pictured, white cap) and Cavanaugh Quarter Horses Inc.'s Woodys Gold are among the 23 state-bred 3-year-olds entered in Saturday's 400-yard New Mexico State Fair Derby (R) trials at Albuquerque Downs.

The 10 fastest qualifiers will meet in the \$200,000-est. final on September 19.

Bigg Dee is coming off of a nose victory in the 400-yard, \$203,000 Zia Derby (G2) at Ruidoso Downs on July 31. A \$30,000 yearling purchase at the 2019 New Mexico-Bred Sale, the Big Daddy Cartel gelding has won six of 11 starts, including two stakes, and he has earned \$200,708.

Bigg Dee drew post 4 and will be ridden by Mario Delgado for trainer James Gonzales II in the second of three trials.

Woodys Gold is a gelded son of Woodbridge acquired for \$10,000 at the 2019 New Mexico-Bred Sale. Trained by Clint Crawford, Woodys Gold has banked \$362,247 from 10 outs, and his three wins include a 1 1/4-length victory in last year's 400-yard, \$387,000 New Mexico State Fair Futurity (RG3) at Albuquerque Downs.

Woodys Gold was a finalist in the May 29, \$361,000 Heritage Place Derby (G2) at Remington Park. The gelding drew post 6 and will be ridden by Mario Delgado in the first heat.



How to Stage a Come-From-Behind Victory With Your Finances

When your enterprise is back on its feet, you can rethink your spending habits, but the key is to survive until then.

Negotiate With Lenders

You might not be able to manage your debt, even with adjustments. In that case, see if you can make your debt cheaper. This might mean consolidating your debt or negotiating better terms with creditors. You might even reach the conclusion that you need to file bankruptcy on all or some of your debt.

Bankruptcy is not the taboo solution it used to be, and asNav points out, you can start rebuilding your credit history — and business — almost immediately. Unfortunately, if you're a sole proprietor, your personal credit can be deeply affected by a bankruptcy. To avoid such issues down the road, consider forming your new business as an LLC (limited liability company).

If your farm's finances wouldn't pass a pre-race exam right now, it's time to take a hard look at your budget. Address your spending and rethink your debts, and look for creative ways to boost income. With the right plan in place, you can finish this race in front — and stay sound for the long haul.






Return Form

Export Broodmare Return Forms

Those that participated in the export broodmare program and took mares home out of state need to remember to submit their return forms as they start bringing their pregnant mares back to New Mexico to Foal. Fees do apply if a form is not on file prior to foaling.

Remember, you can **start** the NMHBA registration process the day your foal is born! You **DO NOT** need to wait until you receive the QH or TB certificates. But remember the horse is **NOT** and official New Mexico Bred until the certificates have been finalized.



Starting with Quarter Horse foals born in 2019, the breeder of record will be whoever owned the mare at the time of **conception**. QH foals born prior to 2019 the breeder of record will still be owner of the mare at time of foaling.

Thoroughbreds remain the same, owner at time of foaling.
