





DO YOU REMEMBER... RITA DANLEY

NMHBA TRUSTEE SPOTLIGHT RITA DANLEY

New Mexico Horse Breeders' Association trustee Rita Danley knows a lot about horse racing – and her education in the industry began at a young age.

Danley is the daughter of Percy Hodges, a longtime Thoroughbred trainer on a Midwest circuit that included Ak-Sar Ben in Nebraska, and Centennial Racetrack near Denver. Both of her grandfathers, Walter Hodges and Omer "Pete" Hall, also trained. In fact, Hall was inducted in the Nebraska Horse Racing Hall of Fame in 1970.

That was the same year that one of Danley's brothers, Walter Hodges – who was named for her paternal grandfather – rode AQHA champion Go Together to victory in the World's Championship Classic at Ruidoso Downs. Several of Danley's uncles also were trainers, and many other family members were racing officials.

The third oldest of six children, Danley was born in Phoenix, Arizona, and attended school in Chickasha, Oklahoma. She has fond memories of spending her summer vacation at some of the country's top tracks.

"Those were fun times," Danley recalls. "They had a little training track at Ak-Sar-Ben, and when we racetrack kids got done with our chores around the barns, we'd sometimes have pony horse races on the training track, or we'd just go ride our horses.

"The trailer court at Ak-Sar-Ben was on the track property, and we used to go riding in the rolling hills up by the training track," she adds. "And at Centennial, a river ran through the track property. There were two bridges across the river into the stable area, and we'd take our horses and swim from one bridge to another. The unwritten agreement was not to swim past the bridges, and none of us kids ever did that."

In addition to being a NMHBA board member for about 15 years, Danley has also served on the board of the New Mexico Horsemen's Association. She is also an accomplished racehorse owner who primarily campaigns her own homebreds. Some of her more notable recent runners include Gotta Get, a son of Celadon and the AQHA champion aged gelding in 2006; 2008

Me, a roan daughter of Lesters Boy who won the 2010 La Coneja Stakes (R) at Sunland Park; Hollywood Gone, a Gone Hollywood mare who won three state-bred stakes in 2005; five-time New Mexico-bred stakes winner and '07 AQHA New Mexico Distance Challenge (G2) runner-up Onstar Cowboy; and Namehimastreaker, a gritty bay gelding by Mitbeastreaker who won 14 stakes and earned \$627,649 from 1996-2004.

Danley's runners are trained by her husband of 46 years, Fred Danley. Current residents of Anthony, New Mexico, about 10 miles north of Sunland Park, the Danleys met at Ruidoso Downs in the early 1960s, when Rita was working as a mutuel clerk and in the track kitchen, and Fred was an assistant trainer for his father, Ike Danley. The couple has two adult children – daughter Destre Burks of Tularosa and son Dusten Danley of Albuquerque – and five grandchildren.

Danley recently visited with our magazine for an interview. **NMHBA Magazine:** You mentioned some childhood memories of spending your summers at the racetrack. What are some others?

Rita Danley: There were a lot of us kids on the backside who were about the same age, so it was a lot of fun. The Little Britches Rodeo was in Denver during the Centennial meet, and a lot of the racetrack kids participated in that. Since then, a lot of those kids got to be really good at rodeo, but at that time most of us just did it because we had a horse, and it was something to

I won the bull riding at the Little Britches rodeo one year, and I'd never ridden a bull before. That was because I could just keep one leg on each side, and it didn't really buck that hard. After we got through walking the racehorses in the mornings, we'd take the saddles off of our riding horses and just ride bareback half the time. We might not go riding every day – maybe it was just two or three times a week. It was just whoever was around.

Then, when summer vacation ended, everybody went in their different directions and went back to school. Except for the summer months, we all pretty much had the same life that other kids had. When we went back to Chickasha, my brothers all played sports. One of my brothers played basketball and got a scholarship to Weatherford (Southwestern Oklahoma State University). I was a member of the Spanish Club, played tennis, and was a cheerleader. One of my little sisters was in the Honor Society. And in those days, schools were a little more flexible in that they'd let you out a week early if you had to leave with your family for the beginning of a race meet.



I remember the first time I saw Sunland Park. My father was training some horses at the track, which had just opened, and we visited one time around Christmas. At that time, I thought Sunland Park was the end of the world. I'd never seen a part of the country that looked like this. I'd been around pretty rolling hills, covered with green grass. And Phoenix, where I was born and had family, was so much greener than El Paso at the time, with orange and lemon groves all over town. It's kind of ironic that I ended up living here.

NMHBA: Did you help your father much around the barn?

Danley: Yes, but I really wasn't that much interested in the training part of it. I'd walk horses, where I'd get on the pony and put one horse on each side. I did that because my mother did it, and if we were shorthanded on help around the barn, we'd all do whatever we could to help out.

It was just a way of life. I remember cleaning out stalls and washing bandages, and there were times when my father would ask me to walk down the shedrow and see if the horses' legs were hot or cold – that kind of thing.

With us back then, it wasn't like we had to be at the track from 6 until 10 every morning. It was more like we were working and playing at the same time. I never really paid much attention

to the horses my father had, but there was one mare I remember. Her name was Em, and I liked her because she would eat candy right out of my hand.

NMHBA: Most breeders and trainers specialize in either Thoroughbreds or Quarter Horses, but you and Fred have had success with both. Why have you decided not to specialize?

Danley: After Fred and I got married, I'd heard people here in New Mexico talk about Quarter Horses, but before I'd moved out here, I really wasn't familiar with any type of racehorses but Thoroughbreds. For us, it's just a matter of adapting just to be competitive.

When Fred was about 18, his dad brought a string of horses to Omaha, so Fred stayed here, and he ended up winning the Kansas Futurity with a horse named Mr. Tinky Bar. So he had Quarter Horses, and he was really successful with them. His father and family were from Alamogordo, and they all had a big interest in Quarter Horses.

Since then, we've just never focused on one breed or the other. We've always had both. It's probably hurt us in some ways, but it's also probably helped us in a lot of other ways. We've trained for people in this state who've had both. We've had loyal owners, like Jimmy Drake, W.T. Stradley, and Tom Williams, and they've always had both Thoroughbreds and Quarter Horses.

NMHBA: One of your homebreds, Gotta Get, won seven stakes in 2006, including the \$400,000 Championship at Sunland Park (G1) against open company, and he was that season's AQHA champion aged gelding. He's still racing – his most recent start was in a 350-yard allowance-optional claiming race at Zia Park on November 26 – and his earnings currently stand at \$972,654. How did that breeding come about?

Danley: We owned Gotta Get's sire, Celadon. We rarely ever do foal shares, but we did a foal share with Gordon Cox, who owned Gotta Get's dam, Chicory Glass. We bought Celadon from his owner, Rancho Jamul out in California, because they wanted to get out of the business. Celadon was still racing at the time, but he fell out of the gate in a race at Albuquerque and got injured, and that's when we decided to start breeding him. We never raced Celadon again after that.

Speaking of Gotta Get, I think we're probably going to retire him. We wanted to win that race at Zia because we'd like to get him over the million-dollar mark in earnings. We think he deserves that. One other thing about him is that no matter what track we're at, the gallop boys tell us that he's always running and playing in whatever pen he's in. And he's sound – we've never had to operate on him. He so competitive, he has no interest in just being a horse. We might try to make a pony horse out of him.

Gotta Get loves the outside post as well as he loves Ruidoso Downs and he showed that in his easy win in the Grade 3 \$45,000 Zia Handicap in the first stakes of the 2007 Zia Day Festival. Gotta Get also won the Zia Handicap in 2006.


Conditioned by Fred Danely and breaking from post ten, Gotta Get, under James Gonzales took command in midstretch as Arealstraitheart faded in the final yards after dueling hard from the inside. The running time was :19.349 seconds.

Gotta Get earned \$27,000 for owners Gordon Cox and Rita J. Danely. Bred by Cox, the 5-year-old son of Celadon out of Chickory Glass has now made the enormous sum of \$702,463. Earlier in the year Gotta Get deadheated with One Special Shade in the West Texas Maturity but was off the board in his last two outings prior to the Zia Handicap.

Arealstraitheart fought hard to hold on to second for M/J Enterprises. The son of Real Runaway was saddled by Ben Torres and was ridden by Esgar Ramirez.

Saguaro Ridge finished third for Robert Grimes. The Dash Ta Fame gelding is trained by Paul Jones and was ridden by Freddie Martinez.

Remaining order of finish was; Stormys Miracle, Chicks A Dashin, Luck N Ofive, Chicks Rimen Native, Ongoing Ta Fame, Familiar Hush and Blazin Irish Pub.

DO YOU REMEMBER ...

NMHBA: How about some of your other successful homebreds?

Danley: We bred one of our mares, Cowgirl Cadilac, to Now I Know to get On Star Cowboy. I thought Now I Know would be a good stallion to breed her to, because he raced at longer distances, he was an AQHA champion, and he raced beyond his 2- and 3-year-old years. To me, that meant he had strength and soundness, and I was hopeful that he would pass that to his offspring.

The first good horse we ever bred was a Thoroughbred colt named Thirty Five. We raced his dam, a mare named Malverie, who was by Viking Spirit. She won a few races early, but she didn't do that much later in her career. So we bred her to Scout Leader and ended up with Thirty Five. The reason we gave him that name is because the stud fee for Scout Leader was \$3,500. We won the Speed Handicap at Ruidoso (in 1980) with Thirty Five.

I remember one time, Fred went out to catch Thirty Five and couldn't catch him. So he finally just pitched a rope around his

neck, which made me angry. Fred didn't hurt him or anything, but I told him that if he had, we'd just pitched \$3,500 in the air. When we decided to breed to Scout Leader, we didn't have \$3,500, but his owners just let us pay it out a little at a time, and that's what we did.

For the most part, Fred and I just breed our own studs to our own mares. We're not nickers. (Fellow breeder and NMHBA board member) Norma Alvarez sometimes says to me, 'Thank God you've never gotten serious about breeding, but every year you come up with a Thoroughbred and Quarter Horse and kick butt with it.'

The truth is, we've never really paid that much attention to it, so I don't know if what we've done as breeders is really that great of an accomplishment. We've gotten pretty lucky with our homebreds, and Fred works hard and is a very good trainer. Fred and I have a good working relationship. I see no sense in running a horse that's sore, or rushing one to the track if he needs more time, and he feels the same way.

We didn't really start out to be breeders. Practically everything we've ever bred is from matching stallions and mares that we've raced.

NMHBA: Why is it important for you to serve on the NMHBA board?

Danley: Bill Galloway was probably the first person who ever talked to me about running for the board. He said he wanted me to consider it, because I'm not afraid to express my opinion, and he thought I was fair-minded and not easily influenced by others. I've always stood up for what I thought was fair, and I think that's one of the reasons I've been able to serve on the board for as long as I have.

There are things I like about New Mexico racing, but I also have some concerns about it. I love the people, especially those on the backside, and I like what expanded gaming has done to increase our purses during the last 10 years or so. At Zia Park, they named a New Mexico Cup Quarter Horse race after Namehimastreaker, and sometimes I've wondered how much money he would have made if he'd been able to run at today's purses.

But our industry has a lot of challenges facing it. I remember back when we were lobbying in Santa Fe to get gaming. We raised quite a bit of PAC money – both the breeders' and horsemen's associations – and we were working together in the best interests of the industry. Mike Weatherly was elected president of both associations, and he spoke with one voice for both entities. I think we need to get back to that – everybody in the industry working together to help it grow.

I attended the AQHA Racing Conference in New Orleans in November, and there was a lady there from Canada who said that their racing industry had come up with a five-year plan. I think it would be great if we in New Mexico could sit down with all entities – track management, horsemen, and breeders – and come up with a long-term five-year plan of our own. We need to be working together toward growing the industry and bringing in new owners.

I'd also like to see more fairness in New Mexico racing, where horsemen with small stables are treated the same as those with larger stables. I remember when my father had horses in Nebraska. He had a small stable, with maybe 10-15 horses at a time. But we felt we were treated just as fairly as those who had bigger stables, like Marion Van Berg.

A few years ago, (horse owner and former New Mexico Racing Commission member) Susan Vescovo asked me what my wish list was for New Mexico racing, and I told her I'd like to see more consistency in our stewards' decisions. I'd like to see us go back to having a reputation for fairness and consistency.







All foals MUST BE conceived and born in NM to be eligible for NM Bred status.

If a registered NM Broodmare in foal to a registered NM Stallion leaves the state of New Mexico:

- The application and the \$500 fee must be postmarked no later than the deadline of October 1st of the breeding year.
 If the application and \$500 fee are NOT received by the applicable deadline, there is a ten day grace period and then the fee increases to \$1,000 for the foal to be eligible for NM Bred status.
- Every donor mare and every recipient mare that is taken to board out of state must have their own form filled out and you must pay \$500.00 for each or the larger \$1,000 penalty if the October 1 deadline is missed.

EXPORT BROODMARE RETURN FORMS BEGINNING WITH 2022 FOALS ARE NO LONGER REQUIRED! You must still fill out the Export Form and pay \$500 per mare by October 1!
