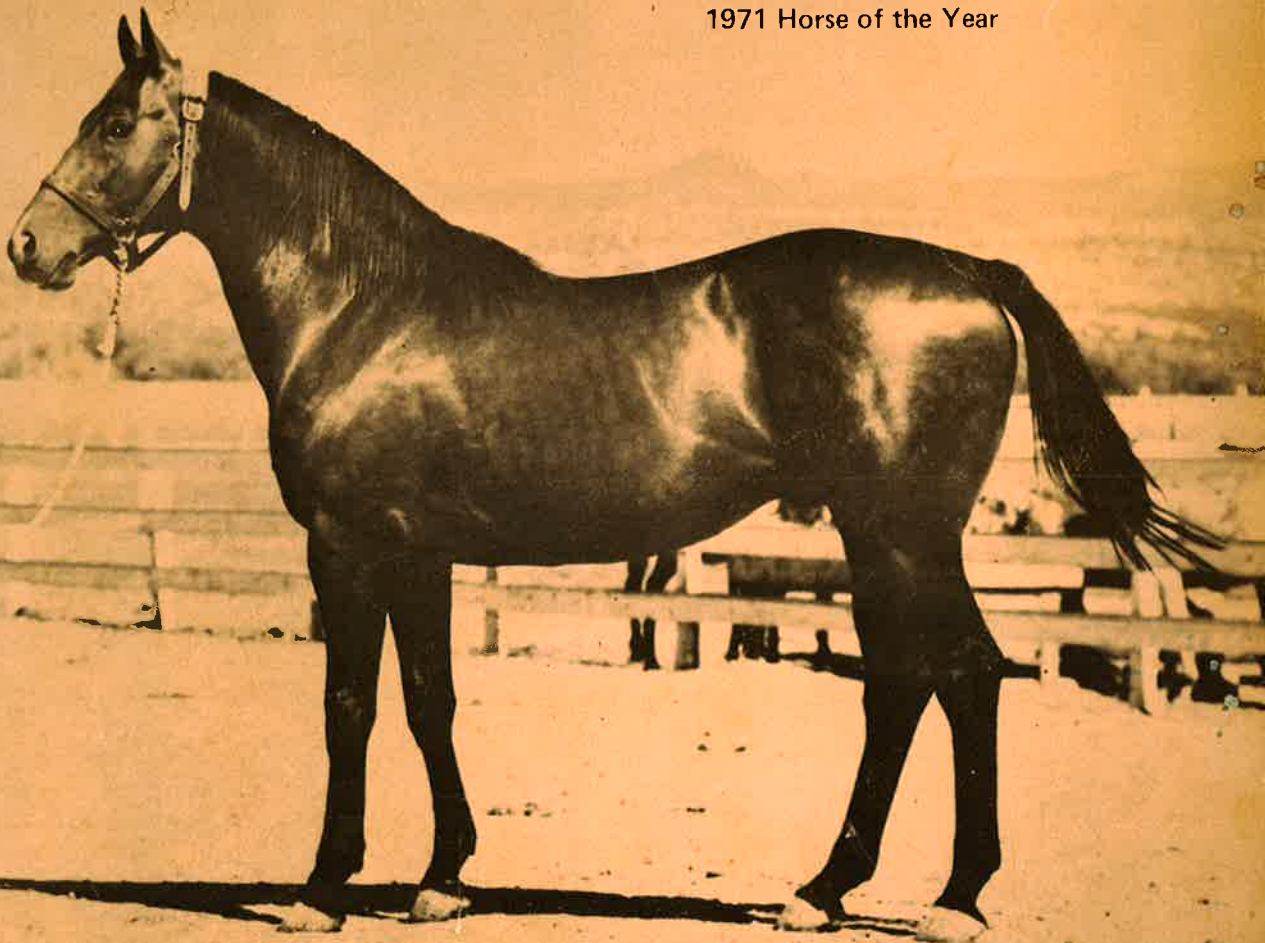

THE NEW MEXICO STATE RACING COMMISSION - has confirmed that it has tentatively approved the sale of Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park to Kodiak Industries, whose principals are Dominic J. and Anthony Alessio and Alvin G. Ross. Commission Chairman Drew Cloud said permission was contingent upon "full disclosure of the personal business and other financial activities of Kodiak Industries . . ."

STATE LIQUOR DIRECTOR CARLOS JARAMILLO - says he will revoke the agent-lessee liquor concession of Sportservice at Ruidoso Downs "as soon as I get the report that the company is a convicted felon". Sportservice is a subsidiary of Emprise Corporation who was convicted recently in California of conspiracy involving an effort to obtain control of a hotel and casino in Las Vegas.

CALIFORNIA'S HORSE PROPERTY TAX - has been replaced by an in lieu annual license fee. Previously, a horse domiciled in the state of California was assessed at 25% of true market value and then liable for an annual tax bill averaging 12% of that amount. The new system has been established on a scale which takes into account the age and sex of breeding animals, the racing records of broodmares and active race horses, and the stud fees of stallions.

THE INTERNAL REVENUE SERVICE SAYS THEY ARE EMPLOYEES - Itinerant exercise boys, pony boys and hot walkers have been declared employees of the trainer for purposes of social security, unemployment and withholding taxes. The ruling has been published and was made prospective.

INVESTMENT TAX CREDIT - regulations have been proposed by the Internal Revenue Service to carry out the 7% investment credit provisions of the Revenue Act of 1971. To qualify for the credit, property acquired after August 15, 1971 or acquired before that date but ordered after March 31, must be depreciable, have a useful life of at least 3 years, be tangible personal property used as an integral part of manufacturing, production, or extraction, and be placed in service by the firm during the year for which the credit is claimed. The regulations were published in the March 24, 1972 issue of the Federal Register which may be obtained by sending 20 cents to the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. 20402.

A SPECIAL NOTICE FROM - the New Mexico Horse Breeders Association. In order to be eligible to enter the trials for the New Mexico Futurity for 1972 and thereafter, each horse must be registered with the New Mexico Horse Breeders Association, and the foal certificate stamped either "New Mexico Bred" or "New Mexico Foaled."

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF STATE RACING COMMISSIONERS -

President Urgel G. Bell has announced committee appointments for the new year. Chairman Drew Cloud has been selected to serve on the Illegal Practices (Special) Committee. George Maloff has been named to the Information and Public Relations Committee. New Mexico will be represented on the Uniform Rules and Practices Committee by J. Leslie Davis.

CLAUDE PEPPER, CHAIRMAN OF THE HOUSE SELECT COMMITTEE ON

CRIME - that has recently been holding typical government hearings on racing or crime (sometimes one simply loses sight of what they are talking about) received the following from Roosevelt Raceway's S. Harvey Fosner: "The unfortunate castigation of an entire industry for the failure of a few is somewhat akin to trying to eradicate mosquitoes with an atomic bomb. More of the same would inflict irreparable harm and injury . . . upon an industry that is providing gainful employment to many thousands of people throughout America, as well as invaluable income tax revenues to the United States and the individual states."

ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT STATEMENTS MADE

during the hearing of the Pepper Committee was by Rep. Jerome Waldie of California, when he said that he didn't know "a damn thing about horses" but thought it would be a good thing if the government abolished racing altogether. Doubtless we can consider the source and evaluate whatever the outcome of the committee . . .

THE ALL AMERICAN FUTURITY WILL BE TELECAST LIVE

- The world's richest horse race will be televised live and in color exclusively by a special network formed to carry the event. The Labor Day race, to be run September 4, 1972, will be carried by approximately 50 stations in at least 10 southwestern and midwestern states for 30 minutes. Two New Mexico stations are scheduled for the program - KGGM-TV, Albuquerque (13) NBC; and KSWs-TV, Roswell (8) NBC. Time of the program will be 5:30-6:00 p.m. MDT. Consult your TV schedule for out of state times and stations.

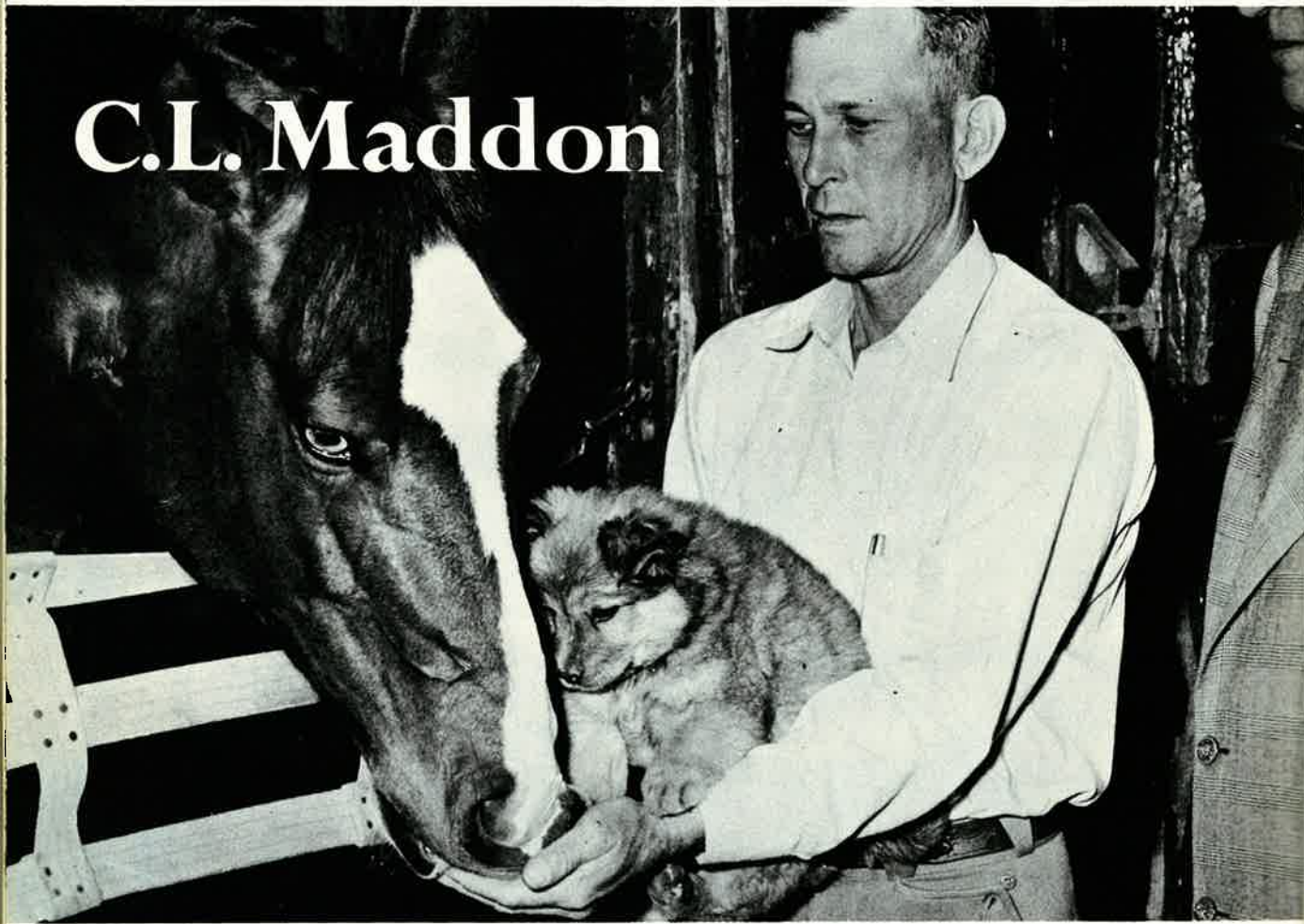

CORNERSTONE OF MODERN QUARTER RACING

he windswept and desolate plains of Willard, New Mexico seem emptier these days. So do a number of Quarter Horse race tracks across the southwest.

They are emptier because of the passing of C. L. Maddon. Had Maddon been a businessman or industrialist contributing as much in those areas as he did to his own passion, his obituary would have been front page news across the nation. But Tess, as he was affectionately known to his friends, was a Quarter Horse breeder, trainer and racing owner. He was one of the modern cornerstones to a sport and industry that is rich in American heritage but, unfortunately, too often neglected when recognition from the mass media is due.

A void was created with Maddon's death for no one will fill his boots. The younger generation will have to work to walk along beside his steps. (Perhaps they won't even want to step into his boots.) But he did leave his love of the American Quarter Running Horse and knowledge of breeding. Maddon was buried a year ago at Mountainair, New Mexico, but the blood line that began with his Bright Eyes will be evident for years to come.

The pioneer blood of the American West surged strong in Maddon's veins. Strong enough to make his lifetime devotion to Quarter Horse breeding and racing tenaciously enduring. He and his wife, Cleo, ranched in a land where rainfalls are measured in a tablespoon, and the wind always seems to blow. The windswept flats and rugged terrain of Willard saw good years and bad years. Twice Maddon sold out his cattle during droughts. They never really complained; just worked harder. The fighting pioneer spirit never faltered.

In good times and bad Maddon had the iron-clad belief of using only good breeding. They always invested heavily to get the best. Maddon's legacy to Quarter Racing begins on the last page (in fact, the last entry) in the American Quarter Horse Association, Volume I Stud Book.

Bright Eyes, by Gold Mount out of Plaudett by King Plaudit (TB), was the beginning of Maddon's live female line. The blood of great horses flowed through Bright Eyes but because of what some people considered questionable breeding and the lack of papers by her dam, the future World Champion Quarter Running Mare was given to Maddon as payment for a feed bill.

A half century before she was foaled, the blood line of Bright Eyes lay with J. E. Madden's Plaudit, winner of the 1898 Run For

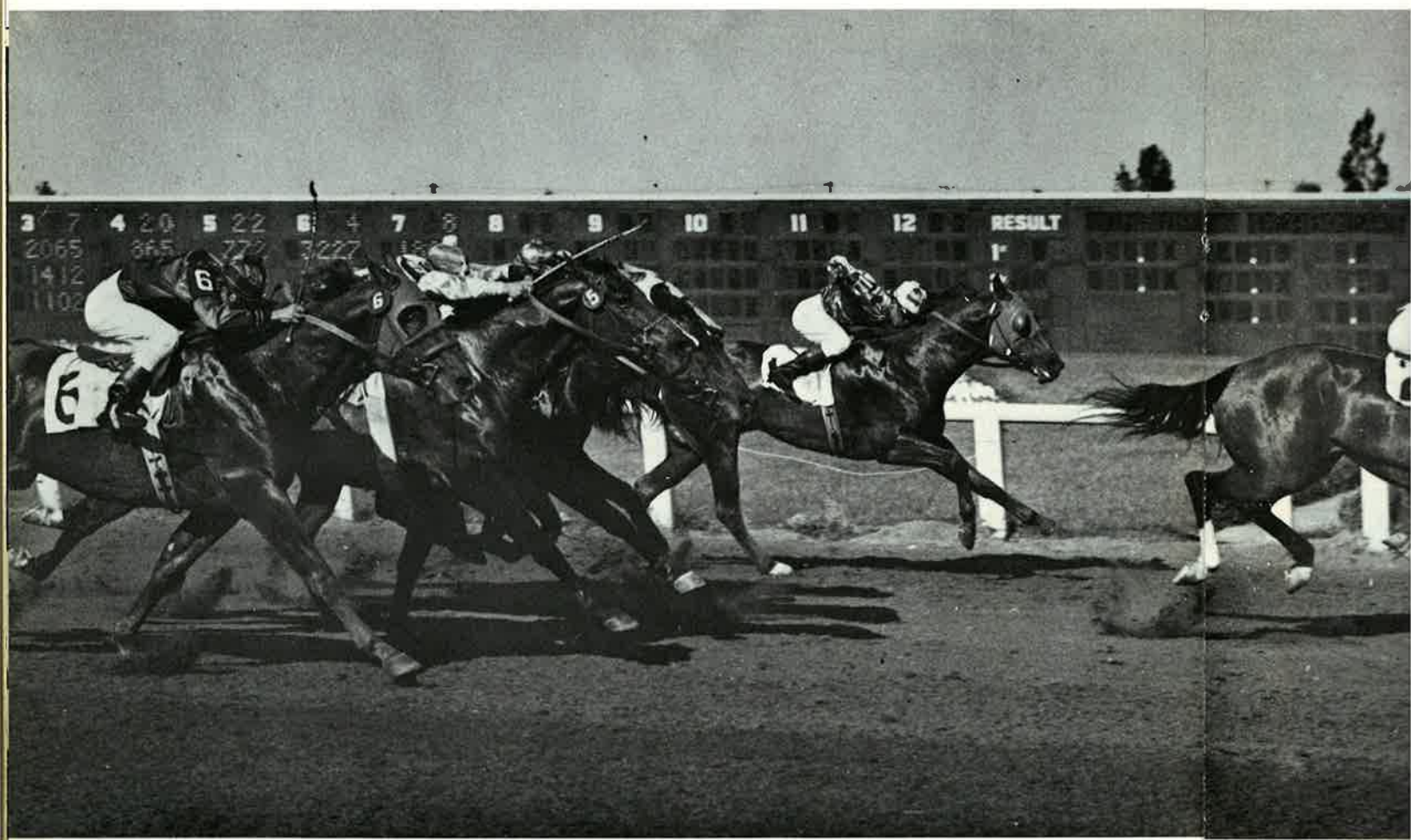


C. L. Maddon Jr. and Cleo Maddon looking to the future and Johnny Boone perhaps looking back on his heritage.

The Roses. One of Plaudit's colts was named King Plaudit whose foal out of Colorado Queen by Old Nick was named Plaudit after his grandsire. The later Plaudit sired Scooter W, the 1948 Champion Quarter Running Horse. He also sired a filly named Miss Helen who was bred to Bush Mount by Chimney Sweep (TB) producing Gold Mount who was bred to Plaudett, an unregistered daughter of King Plaudit (TB); the result - Bright Eyes.

Plaudett's bloodline ran back to Old Fred who was out of the palomino daughter of John Crowder. Old Fred's sire was Black Ball by Missouri Mike who was reportedly sired by Old Cold Deck.

Many stories have been told about Bright Eyes' dam. Nelson C. Nye, writing in a 1964 edition of the Quarter Horse Journal, tells one that personifies the mare. "In her splendid youth she (Plaudett) ran all over New Mexico,

seeing plenty of money change hands in her dust. Fabulous stories are told of those days - how she was even raced for watermelons, and more than just once for a bottle of soda pop. She was a race running son-of-a-gun. One of her owners, in a sweat for quick profits, could not wait to take time to get hold of the right nails but re-shod her with draft horse spikes, bending them over underneath when he couldn't drive them any farther. With this sort of plating they put a farm boy on her who didn't know a latigo strap from a piggin string, ran her half a mile and picked up everything in sight. Before this scared kid could get off, they turned her around and, in a quarter mile purse race, got every dime that had been left in folks' pocket - I like to tell it that way but, as a matter of cold fact, what she got was second money, but you won't find many which could do that today."

Plaudett was bred to Gold Mount by J. Warren Shoemaker of Watrous, New Mexico in 1945. He gave the mare to his uncle, Charles Shoemaker, who reserved the foal for himself and gave the mare to an Indian from Laguna Pueblo. Plaudett was left at the Maddon Ranch. After Bright Eyes was born, Charles changed his mind and decided her breeding didn't make her very valuable. Maddon ended up with the filly and her dam.

Bright Eyes was attractive and in no way resembled her dam. But the running spirit of Plaudett was alive in Bright Eyes. That spirit was first demonstrated during the 1948 New Mexico State Fair at Albuquerque. Bright Eyes won the futurity trials and went on to win the New Mexico Quarter Horse Futurity with a time of 22.5. After that first September running, Maddon - with Bright Eyes, her get,

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and grand get - dominated the New Mexico Quarter Horse Futurity like no other family in the history of the race.

The robust crosses in Bright Eyes' blood were proven on the tracks. She literally mowed down her competition while setting new track and world records and claiming the title of World Champion Quarter Running Mare. As late as 1966 she held two track records.

After 18 wins in 25 starts, 5 - 2nds, and never worse than her one 5th place, Bright Eyes ended her racing career August 29, 1952 at Albuquerque. She went to the field with some of the day's top sprinters for the Open Championship. When the gate sprung open, she broke so hard the tendon on her stifle joint ripped and the bone fractured. She finished the race second with predictions she would never

walk on the injured leg again. For eight days the mare didn't put the injured leg on the ground. Then, back at the Maddon Ranch at Willard, she put her foot down and began a lingering recovery. In that low purse era Bright Eyes earned \$16,500 and finished AAA at five of seven official distances.

Maddon always contended there was nothing as important as the "live female line" when considering breeding horses. He proved this with Bright Eyes. Investing heavily, he bred the mare to the best. Three Bars (TB), Leo, Go Man Go, Jet Smooth and Easy Jet were crossed on mares descending from Bright Eyes and to Bright Eyes. Maddon line bred on the bottom side and produced outstanding horses in crossing back with his own stallions.

Bright Eyes' first foal, Bright Bar by Three Bars (TB), came in 1954. He posted a record of five starts with three firsts, one second and once finished out of the money, his first outing. Bright Bar's second and third outings saw him taken with a virus. Running with a 103 degree temperature, he qualified in futurity trials and went on to win the event. He was qualified AAA and retired to stud service. His first colt, Bar Bright AAA out of a full sister to Bright Eyes, ran second to Rebel Cause during Derby trials at Ruidoso. Several of his get won on the straightaways and in the show ring. One, Bright Baby, was the two-year-old Grand Champion Mare at the 1961 New Mexico State Fair.

Bright Eyes was barren in 1955. She foaled Bright Red by Leo in 1956. Bright Red did not race as a two-year-old because Maddon had Bright Eyes in a sling trying to keep her alive. As a three-year-old he won three and placed fourth once during five starts.

In 1957 Bright Eyes foaled Me Bright, a bay filly by Leo. While Maddon was breaking Me Bright she fell in a gopher hole. The injury would plague her for the rest of her life. She won her trials at Ruidoso but was disqualified with "no time." She next ran at the New Mexico State Fair, winning the futurity trials.

The race preceding the futurity was won by Bright Red while Bright Red's son, Bright N' Ready, won a blue ribbon at halter the same day.

During Me Bright's third racing year the injury began to bother her again so Maddon sent her back to the ranch. She again ran at Ruidoso during her fourth year, winning in AAA time.

Bright Eyes' fourth and final foal came in 1958, Lady Bright Eyes by Leo, arriving after

Bright Eyes had begun to go lame. Labeled the best of the Bright Eyes foals, Lady Bright Eyes had to be put to sleep. She had a small navel rupture and tore it open while she was being tied to have the abnormality repaired.

Bright Eyes was in pain and unable to get around with no hope for complete recovery. Maddon was finally forced to put her away on June 29, 1958. During her career she won the New Mexico Quarter Horse Futurity in 1948 and was named to AQHA Running Championships in 1949, 1950 and 1951. Won all the Tucson Speed Stakes in 1950. Her daughter won the Futurity in 1959 and her son in 1956. The Maddon home is flooded with many silver platters along with memories of her thrilling days at the track.

With Bright Eyes gone, Maddon trained and went to the track with his Bright Eyes produce. Bright Bardee AAT by Vandy out of Plaudit's Babe, Bright Eyes' full sister, won the New Mexico State Fair Derby in 1967 and earned a total of \$45,074.91. She was a Grand Champion at halter and produced See Him Go AAAT, the top money winning son of Go Man Go.

With the exception of Bright Red's colts, the second generation foals of Maddon's line have mostly lost the stocking, bald face and blue eye of their famous granddam. Maddon liked the color on the early colts. The excessive white characteristics of Plaudette were so recessive they disappeared into the predominant bays, blacks and sorrels. Me Bright showed a partly

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"bright" eye. What did persist in the line was quality and speed.

Maddon received the New Mexico Horseman of the Year award from the New Mexico Quarter Horse Association in 1970. Warren Shoemaker, who bred Gold Mount to Plaudett to produce Bright Eyes, presented the award. Cleo Maddon said the award meant as much to her husband as winning the futurity.

C. L. "Tess" Maddon was buried at Mountainair. His daughter, Mrs. JoAnn Sefton, composed and delivered the service and eulogy. The service ended with the playing of the race's first call on the bugle. The following is part of Mrs. Sefton's eulogy:

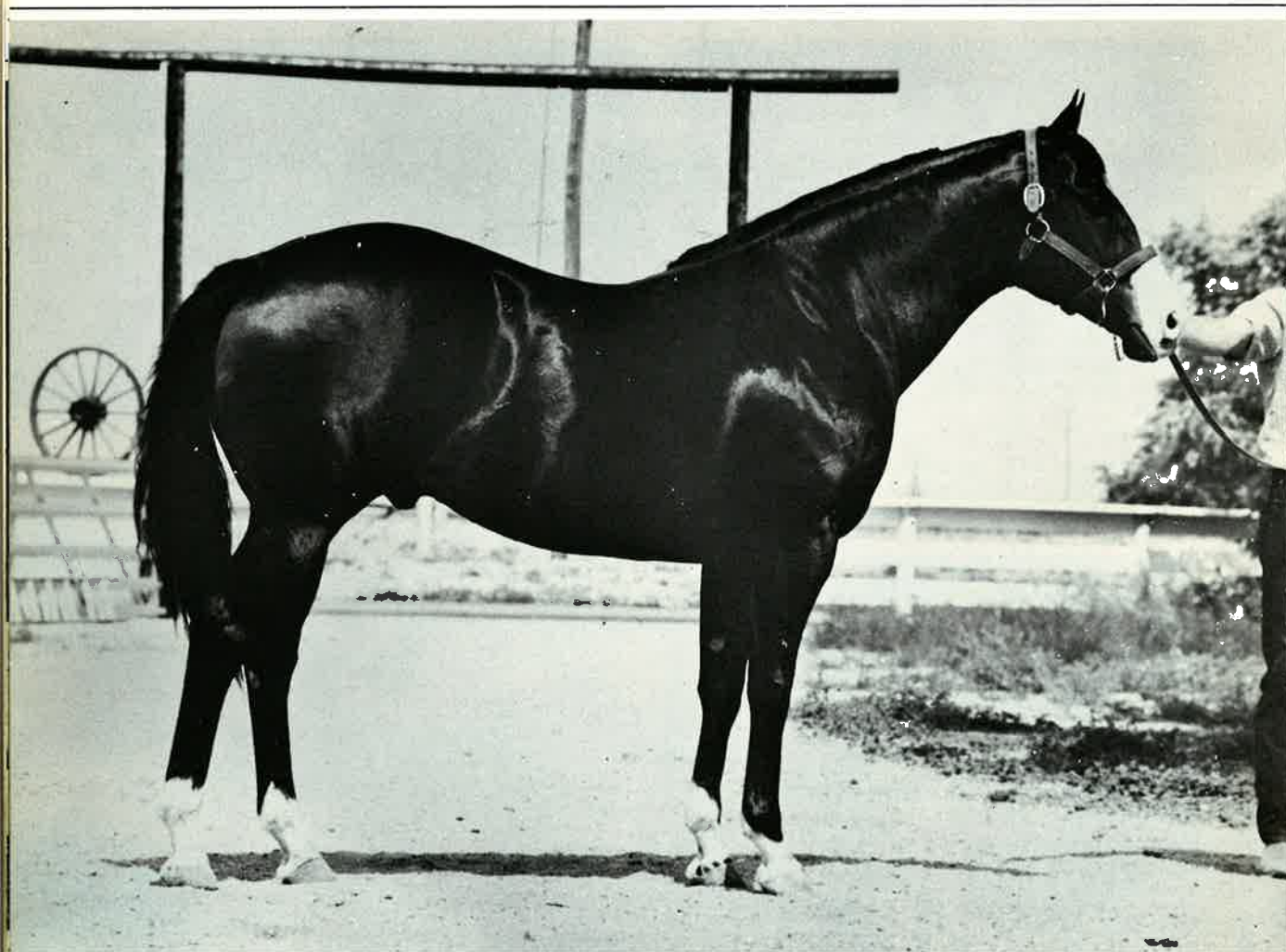
"Dad wasn't an outwardly religious man. He lived his beliefs and faith from within. I have

He lived to the last morning of his journey here doing exactly what he wanted. His going leaves a space in all our lives that can never be filled. There are no apprentices coming up to fill his boots.

There is comfort in knowing that on the other side there are dear friends and family - among these his beloved Bright Eyes - waiting to welcome home a weary traveler. His legacy

L. Maddon and Bright Eyes.

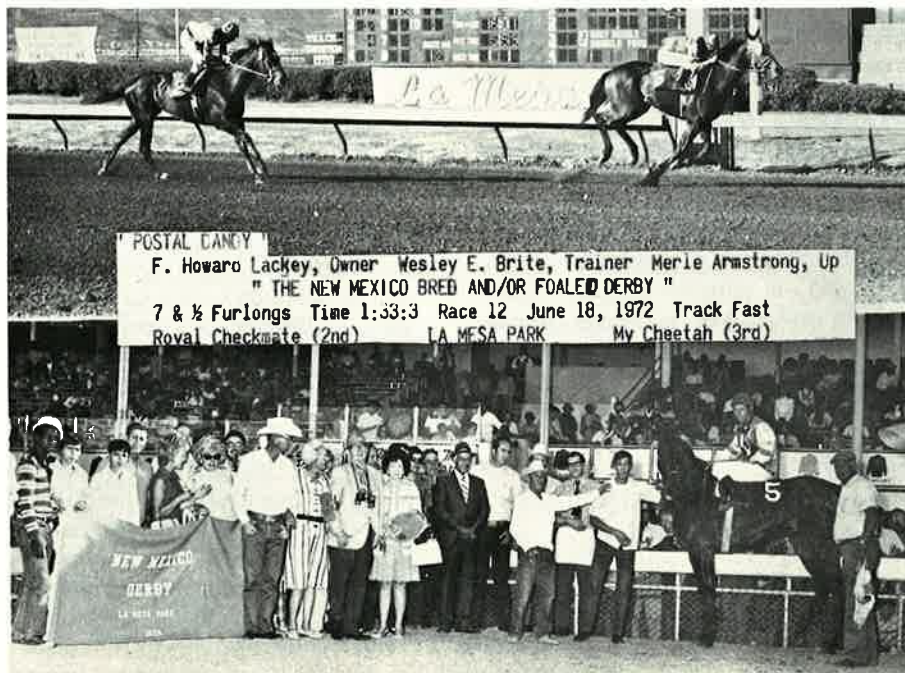

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PERTAINING TO NEW MEXICO BREEDERS

(Ed. Note: The following rules are from the Handbook of Rules and Regulations published by the State of New Mexico. In the event our readers do not have a copy, we have selected only the rules that concern New Mexico. Registration, Breeder Awards, Definitions, and other topics of vital interest.)

NEW MEXICO STATUTES

60-6-10.1 - Breeders' Awards.

To promote and improve the quality of race horse breeding in New Mexico, a sum of money equal to 10% of the first money of every purse won at a commercial meet by a horse registered with the New Mexico Horse Breeders Association as New Mexico bred, shall, upon certification of the state racing commission, be paid from the breeders' fund by the state treasurer to the owner of the dam of the animal at the time the animal was foaled. Any claim or dispute concerning a dam of a horse shall be determined by the state racing commission, subject to review by the New Mexico Horse Breeders Association and adopted, changed or rescinded by a majority of the Commission at a regular meeting. The Commission may make exceptions or waive any rule or rules in individual instances as in the judgment of the Commission it may be deemed advisable. Jurisdiction of the Commission over matters related to subjects covered by law or rules and regulations of the Commission is continuous throughout the year.

1.03 In matters pertaining to racing, the orders of the stewards supersede the orders of officers, directors or representatives of the licensee.

Any person aggrieved by any ruling so made shall have the right of appeal to the Commission, and further right to appeal to a court of record. (See Rule 25.07).

DEFINITIONS

2.04 Breeder of a horse is the owner of its dam at the time of foaling.

2.20 New Mexico Bred is a foal dropped by a mare in New Mexico after being bred in New Mexico and remaining in the state until said foal is weaned.

2.21 New Mexico Foal is a foal dropped in New Mexico whose dam has remained in the state until the foal is weaned.

TYPE OF RACE

(g) New Mexico Race means a race in which the contestants are New Mexico Bred and Foal horses as stipulated in the Conditions.

6.27(a) The Racing Secretary shall write at least one race each day of racing restricted to New Mexico Bred and/or Foal horses. Should the original race fail to draw seven separate interests, an extra race conditioned for New Mexico Bred and Foal horses shall be written at an early hour and shall be used. This extra race shall have preference over any other substitute or extra race. The Racing Secretary may write the original or substitute New Mexico Bred and/or Foal race for Thoroughbreds or Quarter Horses.

BREEDERS' AWARD

26.03 Licensee shall pay to the Commission at least 60 days prior to the opening of a Race Meeting (or at the time the daily license fee for a proposed meeting is paid) a sum equal to 10% of the first money of every purse won by a horse registered with the New Mexico Horse Breeders Association as New Mexico Bred, except stake race purses, in which case an amount equal to 10% of the added money will be paid.

Licensee shall make lump sum payment of Breeders' Awards, the total of which shall include all awards payable for the calendar year (January 1 through December 31) preceding time of payment of daily license fee for a proposed meeting, or succeeding a calendar year when a race meeting is in progress, such payment to be made to the Commission not later than June 1 of each year.

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Rules & Regulations

The payment shall be accompanied by a certified list to include date of race, name of horse, name of breeder, amount of first money and amount of award included in payment, said list to be certified that, from all records available, the amount of payment and accompanying list cover the period January 1 through December 31, 19___ and are true and correct to licensee's best knowledge.

The New Mexico Horse Breeders Association shall furnish a complete, certified list of all New Mexico Bred Thoroughbred and Quarter Horses registered with it from the inception of its Official Registry through June 18, 1965, said list to include breeder's name and last known address, name of horse and date of registration, and shall thereafter on January 1 of each calendar year submit a complete certified list of all New Mexico Bred Thoroughbreds and Quarter Horses registered with it during the preceding calendar year. The Commission shall furnish certified copies of these lists to the licensee and the State Treasurer immediately upon receipt of same.

The New Mexico Horse Breeders' Association will be required to certify to the Commission between June 1 and June 30 of each year that all breeders and horses appearing on licensee's Breeders' Award payment list are eligible, and that the breeder is entitled to the award in accordance with requirements or registration, payment of fees, etc., and that same is a matter of permanent record in the office of the Association.

The breeder may, upon request, be required to furnish affidavit or certification as to eligibility to receive payment of award, such request to be made by the Commission.

The Commission, upon receipt of payment of awards from licensee, shall deposit same with the State Treasurer to the Special Breeders'

Fund and shall, upon proper certification of the New Mexico Horse Breeders Association, between July 1 and 10 of each calendar year, certify to the State Treasurer the name of the breeder, name of the horse, and amount of award to be paid from the Special Breeders' fund, such certification and order for payment to be in the manner prescribed by the State Treasurer and the Department of Finance and Administration of New Mexico.

In event of death of breeder to whom an award is payable, it shall be the duty of the administrator of his or her estate to notify the Commission and the New Mexico Horse Breeders Association, and to stipulate in such notice the name and address of the person, firm, estate or corporation eligible to receive payment of award.

The New Mexico State Fair is excluded from participation.

ENTRIES AND SUBSCRIPTIONS

26.05 (a) New Mexico Bred and Foal horses must be registered with the New Mexico Horse Breeders Association designated by state statute as the Official Registry. The Official Registry seal must be affixed on the foal certificate deposited with the Racing Secretary before a horse is eligible for entry in a New Mexico Bred and/or Foal race and before the breeder is eligible to participate in the New Mexico Breeders' Awards.
