Upstart Turn Lea Turn Upsets Strong Field in El Dorado

Turn Lea Turn, a 42-1 longshot, muscled her way through the stretch to grab a stunning upset in the second running of the El Dorado Stakes at Sunland Park.

The filly, ridden by Arthur Anderson, nipped Peaceful Lecture on the final, desperate lunge to capture \$4,455 of the gross \$8,910 purse in the blue ribbon event designed as an allowance for three-year old New Mexico bred or foaled.

Turn Lea Turn is owned by T. T. Sanders, Jr. of Roswell, NM, and was trained by Bob Arnett.

The Passing Parade

HARVEY FOSTER, LONGTIME EXECUTIVE SECRETARY for the New Mexico State Racing Commission, has been named an honorary life member of the National Association of State Racing Commissioners. Foster thus moves into a highly select circle which includes only a handful of racing officials of national stature. The move to elevate Foster into the status of life membership came during the annual NASRC convention at Bal Harbour, Fl., in January. Foster, now retired, began his long career as a placing judge at Caliente in the early 1930's. Over the years he held just about every job in racing before beginning his 11-year stint with the State Racing Commission.

CHARLIE CONNALLY OF ALBUQUERQUE, the oldest living owner-trainer in the State of New Mexico, was given special recognition at the annual meeting of the New Mexico Horse Breeder's Association, January 22. Connally raced horses at the first race meeting held in the State in 1938. His best horse was Noo Music.

CONGRESSMAN SAM STEIGER OF ARIZONA has introduced two new measures. . .one, a bill providing for the taxing and licensing of racing associations by the Director of Internal Revenue; the other, making it a federal crime to tamper with a racing animal, to attempt to influence an animal's performance, or to obscure its ownership. The National Association of State Racing Commissioners has gone on record as opposing the licensing measure, and several racing commissions have registered their objections to the Congressman.

A 100 PERCENT INCREASE in the horse population in the United States during the past decade has been reported by Henry Durham, executive vice president of the American Horse Council. Listing a current equine population of eight million, Durham said, "The horse industry is growing today at a pace which would have been impossible to forecast a decade ago. It is interesting to note, and certainly of some importance to the horse breeder, that the horse population is now increasing at a rate between eight and ten per cent per year.

THE FIRST CASE ALLEGING A VIOLATION under the Horse Protection Act was on the docket for trial in Waco, Tx., February 26. About 225 other Horse Protection Act violations are now being processed, according to the Agriculture Department's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service which is charged with administering the Act.

THE 1973 RUNNING OF THE ALL AMERICAN FUTURITY at Ruidoso Downs is moving briskly on course toward the anticipated gross purse of \$1,030,000, according to general manager Al Rosa. A total of 592 youngsters met the fifth payment of \$300 to boost the kitty to \$606,425. Payments of \$400 and \$500 are due March 15 and June 15, respectively, with a \$750 fee on trial entry day. Under the new format, all money in excess of \$1,030,000 will be diverted into the 1974 inaugural of the All American Derby.

Passing Parade

THE "LAND OF ENCHANTMENT STAKES" combining a 1974 Thoroughbred Futurity and a 1975 Derby at La Mesa Park, has attracted an all-time high of 1,023 original nominees from owners in 29 states, Mexico and Canada. In the 1972 American Racing Manual, the "Land of Enchantment Futurity" was ranked as the nation's seventeenth richest race for Thoroughbred freshmen in 1971 and it appears headed for the "top ten" in 1973.

RETIREMENT CEREMONIES WERE HELD RECENTLY at Sunland Park for three top Thoroughbreds who reached the age of 12 and are too old to race in New Mexico. The three, Mr. Thru Bound, a winner of \$25,000 in 33 trips to the winner's circle; Toro Boy, winner of 21 races for a total of \$15,000; and Alvy T., a winner of 17 races and over \$11,000. Each was honored with a blanket and a bag of carrots. Their owners each received a bottle of champagne.

THE 1973 EDITION OF THE RILEY ALLISON Thoroughbred Futurity at Sunland Park is expected to reach a gross purse of at least \$125,000. Nominations for the 10th running of the juvenile classic closed with 263 entries. This represents a gain up from 206 in 1972. The 1973 edition of the five furlong event will be run Sunday, May 13, the final day of the spring meeting. Trials are scheduled to be held May 4.

DALE ROUK OF AMARILLO, TEXAS, has been named as the new Director of Publicity and Public Relations for La Mesa Park according to track president Eric Culver. Rouk has been associated with the California Quarter Horse Sales for the past four years. Rouk replaces Mrs. Bobbye Culver and Ann Moffitt who resigned their positions February 1.

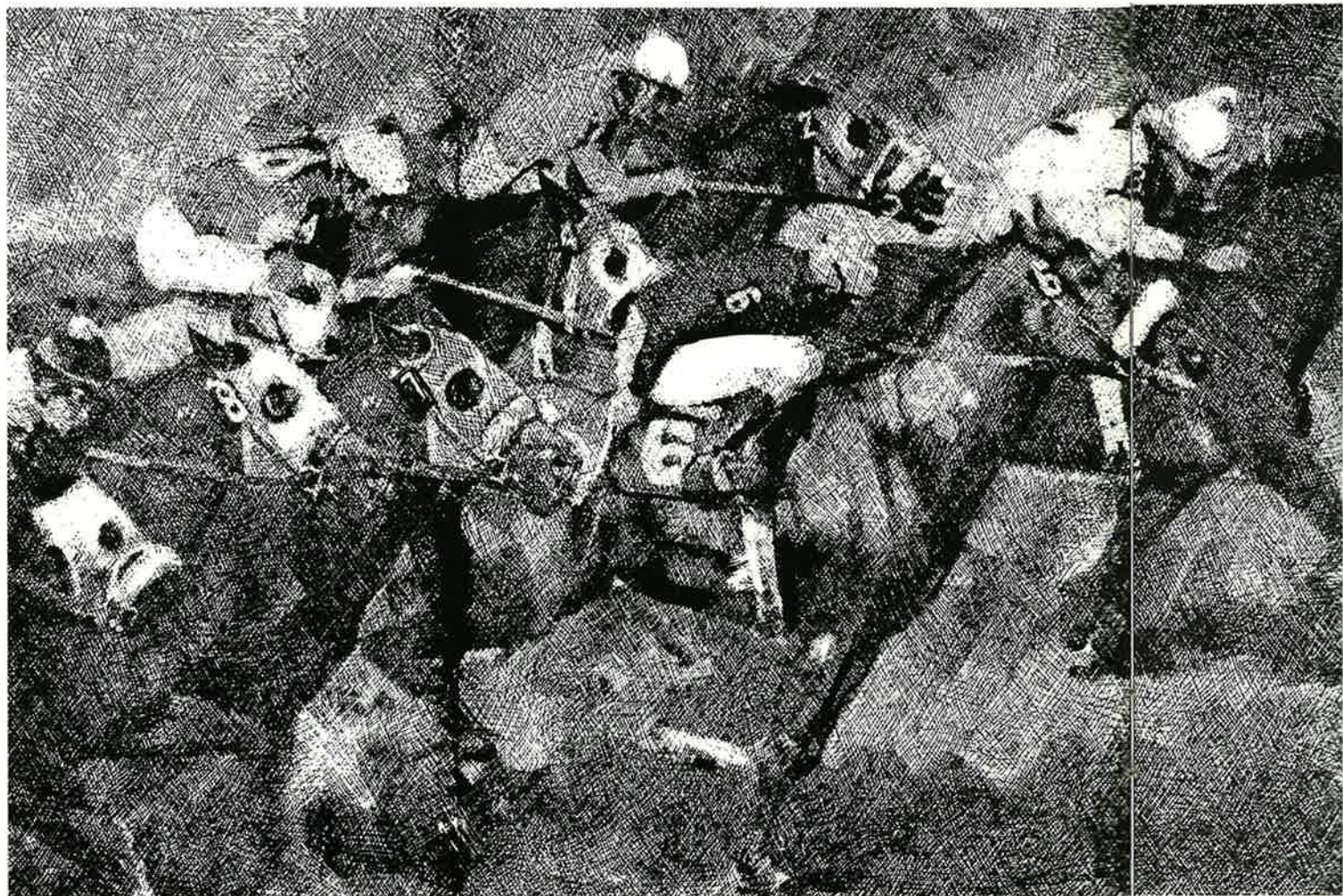
THE ANNUAL THOROUGHBRED YEARLING sale at La Mesa Park has been set for two evening sessions, August 10-11, in the Lower Club House at the track. An estimated 200 well-bred youngsters, most of whom are eligible for Raton's rich "Land of Enchantment" 1974 Futurity and 1975 Derby, are expected to be consigned to the eighth annual sale. The 1972 sale was highly successful with 154 top yearlings selling for a gross total sales of \$372,000.

RICHARD LIDBERG, A STEWARD AT SUNLAND PARK, will resign his position effective April 1 to accept the job of director of racing at Centennial Race Course, Denver. Lidberg has served in various capacities at New Mexico tracks, including a stewardship at Ruidoso Downs.

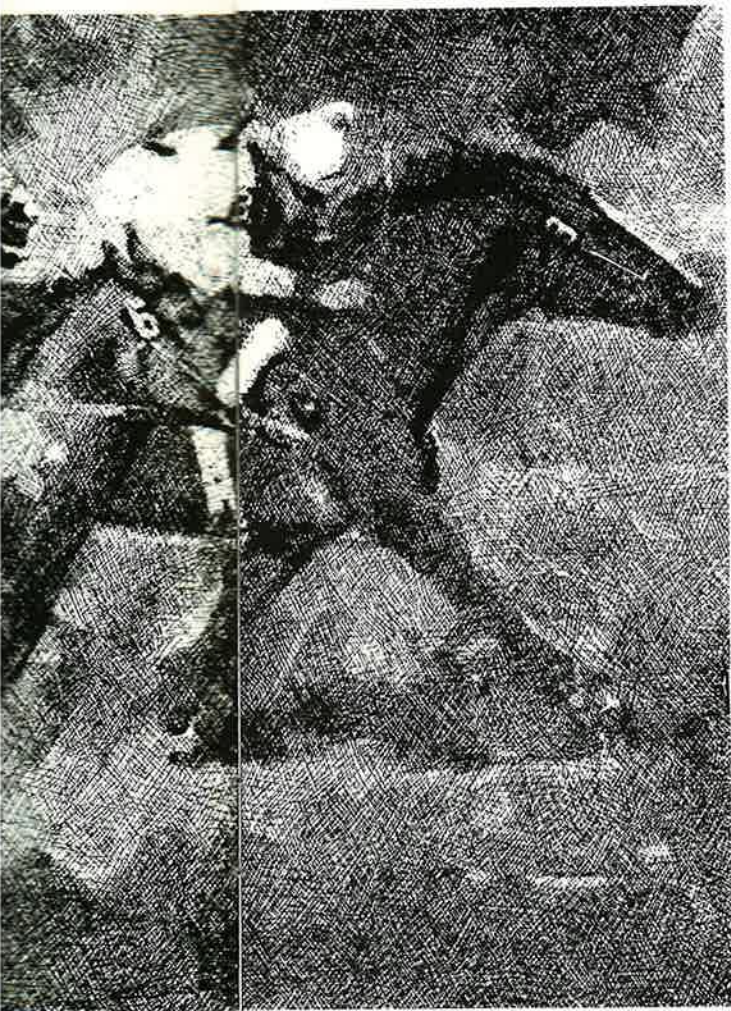

RESOLUTION

FEBRUARY 23, 1973

RESOLVED: The New Mexico Horsemen's Association is opposed to the petition submitted to the New Mexico Racing Commission requesting a change of rules to allow horses to race which are not stabled on the Grounds of a Race Track in the State of New Mexico.

Reasons for this Association's position on the subject are enumerated below:

1. LACK OF PROPER SECURITY.

With horses stabled at a number of training tracks and various farms and ranches, it is almost an impossible task to check on personnel tending to the animals and, likewise, to check on illegal equipment and practices.

2. HORSES WILL HAVE NO CHANCE TO RACE REGULARLY.

As it has been experienced in the past (when off-track racing is permitted), a great number of horses (mostly undesirables) appear in the area. This causes several times more entries each day. Trainers cannot run their horses regularly with only three days a week of racing.

3. MANY PEOPLE BELIEVE THERE WILL BE A TENDENCY FOR RACING SECRETARIES TO ALLOT A TRAINER THREE OR FOUR STALLS AND THEN APPROVE EIGHT OR NINE HORSES TO RACE.

This means added expense for the Owners and Trainers as it takes more labor, equipment, and, in addition, stall rent.

4. IT IS A FACT THAT MORE OF RACING'S UNDESIRABLES SHOW UP IN THOSE AREAS WHERE OFF-THE-GROUNDS RACING IS PERMITTED.

These undesirables run out on bills, spread bad checks, and "bad-mouth" the race track, stating they cannot get on the grounds. This causes a bad image of the Racing Industry in its trade territory.

5. HORSE OWNERS AND TRAINERS ARE WELL AWARE OF THE STABLING PROBLEMS OF TRACK MANAGEMENT.

Horsemen believe after paying many dollars for the stake races in nomination fees that help the race track to progress, it is unfair to have to pay stall rent off the grounds in order to participate in racing.

OFF-TRACK ENTERING AND RACING IS NOT A SOLUTION TO THE PROBLEM.

The annual meeting of the New Mexico Horse Breeders Association was held at the midtown Holiday Inn in Albuquerque on January 22, with some 100 horsemen and their families attending from throughout the state.

Retiring President Winford Carlile stated following the dinner that the horse industry in New Mexico had taken giant steps during the year 1972 and that he felt that this was only the beginning. "Promises are great that New Mexico can become recognized as one of the West's major horse breeding center," he said, citing the arrival of many outstanding stallions in the state, including the leading sire of running Quarter Horses, Go Man Go, at the new Buena Suerte Ranch near Roswell.

President Carlile further pointed out that 1972 was a

milestone for the New Mexico horse industry when the NMHBA launched its own publication, *The Race Horse of New Mexico*. "We have had excellent support from the New Mexico Horseman's Association and the tracks, to mention a few, with advertising in the magazine, but the magazine also needs certain data which must come from the breeders themselves. *The Race Horse* has a great future but it can be great only with your support.

"I wish to express my appreciation to the Board for the outstanding job they have done this year. To the membership, it has been my

— Legislative Report

The recently ended 31st Legislature was characterized, in the opinion of many of us who have observed legislative bodies over the past several years, by a lack of experience, a tremendous glut of bill introductions, a confusion over process, and an inability to deal with controversial legislation with

decisiveness and dispatch. This attitude was particularly evident in regard to the legislation which had to do with the racing industry in this state. As is usual, our industry was favored with a great deal of legislative attention and conflict in several areas.

The objectives that we in the breeding area of the racing industry had in mind were to insert into the statutes a more specific definition for a "practical breeder of race horses". This definition has to do with the present provision in the statutes that at least three of the five members of the New Mexico Racing Commission shall be practical breeders.

A second, and more important objective was to ask the Legislature to allocate more money to the Breeder's Award Fund. The Breeders Association feels that this fund has provided an incentive to the steady progress in race horse breeding investment within the state. The expansion of this award fund from revenues derived from the racing industry itself could be used to provide a more inclusive purse program at all New Mexico tracks for New Mexico bred horses and create even greater stimulation for the New Mexico race horse breeding industry, as it has done in most of the other racing states throughout the United States.

Bills meeting the objectives of the Breeder's Association were drawn up and introduced into the 31st Legislature, and were immediately drawn into the conflict and confusion being generated by other racing legislation considered by committees of the Senate and House.

Presentations were also made to winners of the New Mexico Bred and New Mexico Foaled Derbies at the State Fair. They were — Thoroughbred: Leemise, owned by Virginia R. Pate, Tucumcari, New Mexico; and Quarter Horse: Cinco De Marzo, owned by Dr. Dale Beltz and Vernon Gramling of Kennewick, Washington.

Carlile said that the Board of Trustees had decided to present an Annual Breeders' Award, and that it was to be presented to the outstanding breeder who had contributed the most to the

breeding program in New Mexico. Presentation was made to Dr. Joe Miller for his management of the Thoroughbred stallion, Binary, who sired 18 two-year-old winners in 1971 to become the top sire on the North American continent. Binary was also second in national standings in races won by two-year-olds in 1971.

Members of New Mexico racing associations were introduced and asked to tell the attendees of their plans for the coming season.

Following the presentations and introductions there was an election of new trustees for the year 1973. Newly elected trustees are — Quarter Horse: Joe Skeen, Jess Burner and Gene Petchesky. Holdover Quarter Horse trustees are: Helen Mathieson, Cleo Maddon and Bob Lee. Thoroughbred: Dr. John Byrd, Edwin Wood and Ozzie Reeves. Holdover Thoroughbred Trustees are: G. I. Martin, Les Davis and Dan Goodman.

The trustees elected the following slate of officers for '73: President, Bob Lee; Vice President, Edwin Wood, Ozzie Reeves and Helen Mathieson, and Rosemary Crow, Secretary-Treasurer. ●

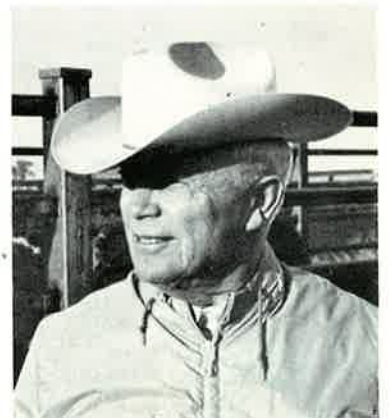

*The Breeder Award Law went into effect on May 18, 1964, providing for 10% of the win purse to be paid to the breeder of a New Mexico Bred Winner on July 1 of the succeeding year. 1972 awards won will be paid to breeders on July 1, 1973, unless the law is revised to provide for an earlier payment. Track operators pay 100% of these awards. The increase is encouraging and confirms the intent of the legislation to improve the quality of horses bred in the State. To be noted is the increase of breeding farms since 1965 and the introduction of outstanding sires and dams representing addition of several million dollars in investment in New Mexico.

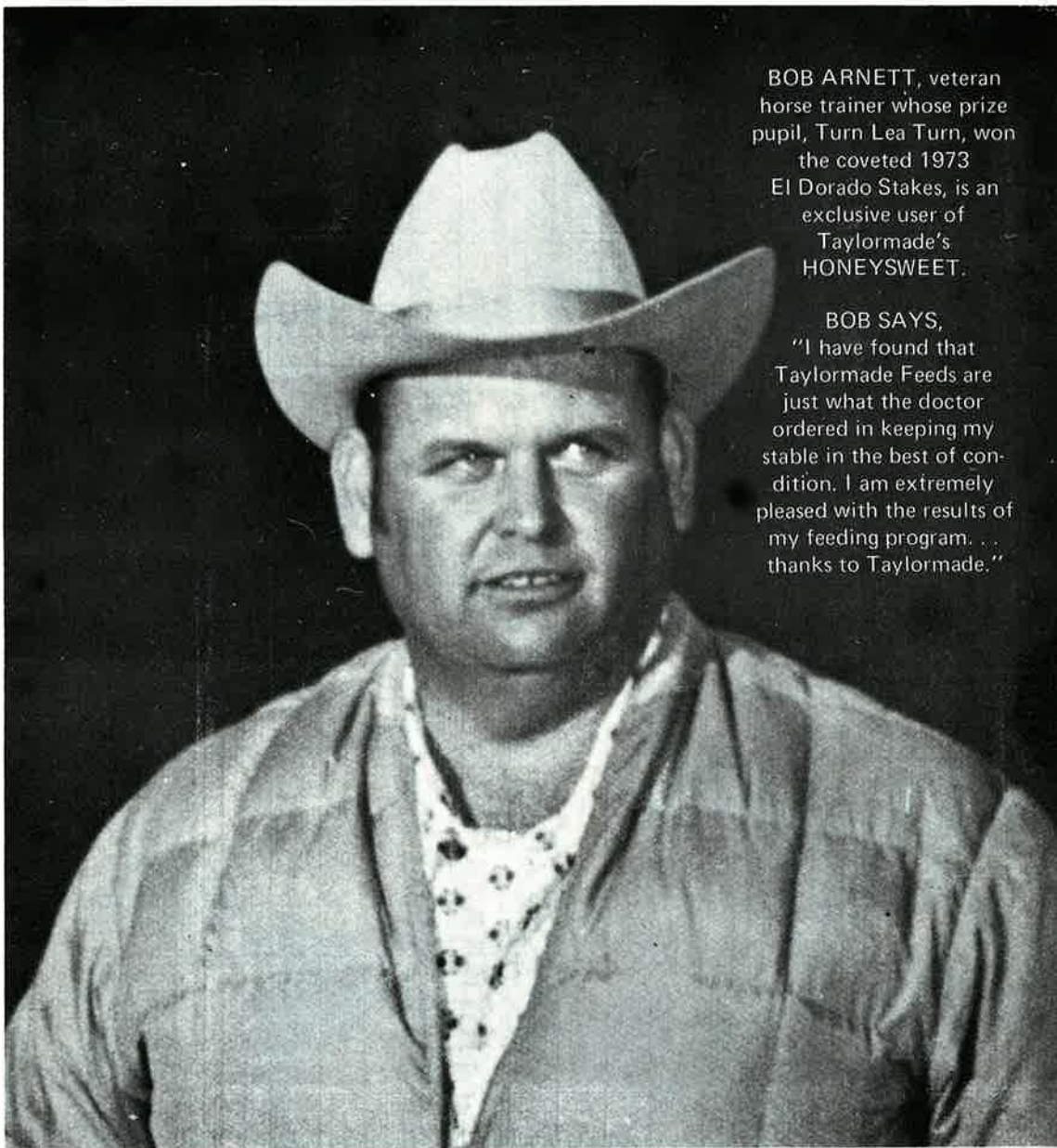

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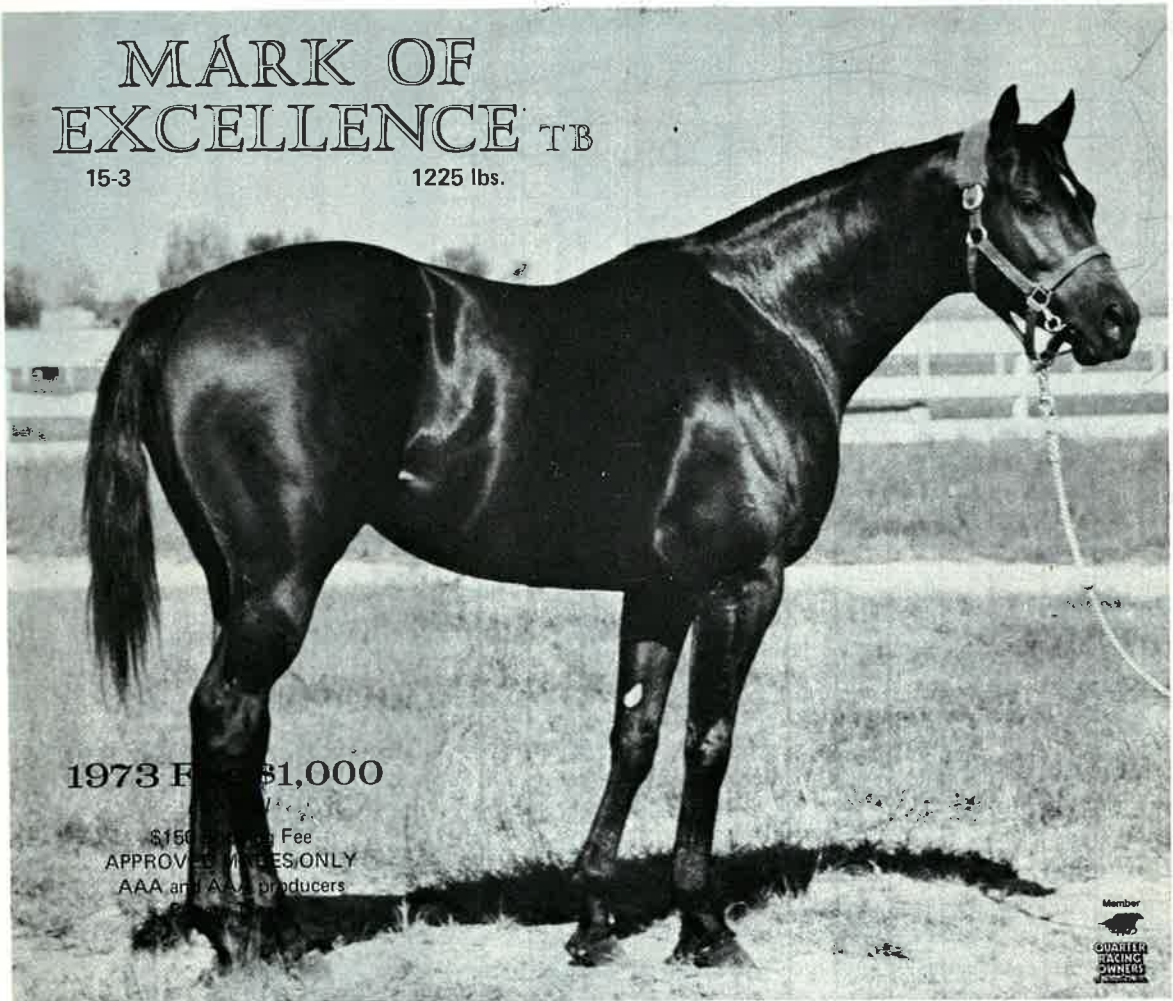

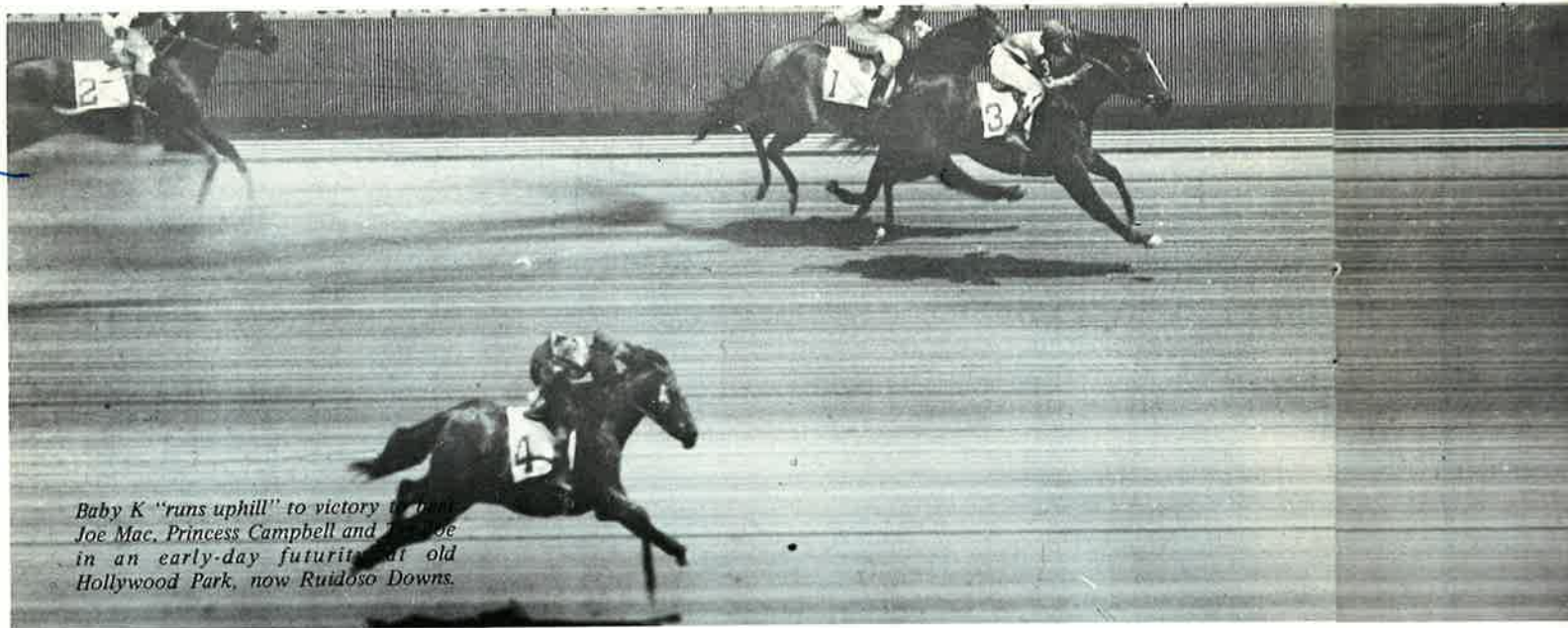

Jake McSpadden and Baby K....

A Pair

Jake McSpadden settled back in his easy chair, rubbed the slight bristle of his beard, and looked out over the canyon where the popcorn snow peppering Ruidoso had just begun to change into wet sticky flakes.

"Some people may say we didn't have good horses back then," he mused, "but we did. What we didn't have were the good racing strips present today."

What prompted this retort was a question which had been put to him about comparing horses like Baby K, Wonder Lad, Pretty Boy, Miss Wichita, Joe Mac, Princess Campbell, Miss Bank, Miss Pinkey, Vinageron, Double Red and others (subjects of an earlier conversation) to current runners.

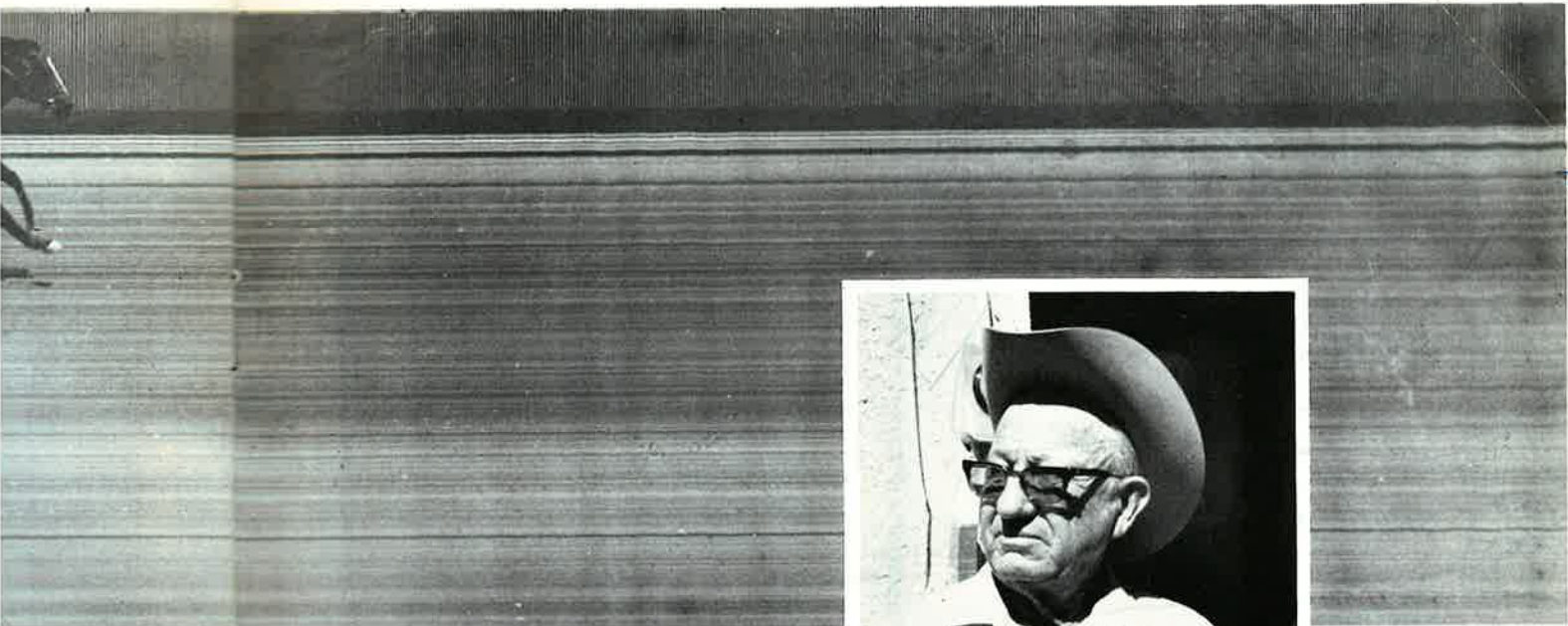
"Just take the time Baby K, my horse, won the Second Annual Futurity back in '47 at Hollywood Park (the original name of Ruidoso Downs). Man, at that time, the track had about a 17-foot upgrade to run in the 440 and the track wasn't worked between every race as it is today; in fact, if it got worked once a week things were good.

"So, Baby K runs it in :23.6," said McSpadden. "How in the world can you compare? And say," he expounded, "although this particular race was billed as the Second Annual Futurity, I have found no one who remembers the 'First'. So, I believe Baby K was the winner of the first futurity run at what is now known as Ruidoso Downs.

"There were 16 nominees who ran trials for that futurity," gushed McSpadden, who verbalizes information about horses in a steady gale tempo with occasional gusts up to hurricane velocity. "We ran it in four heats, four horses in each. We came back the following week to take the finals handily, with Joe Mac, Princess Campbell and Tee Joe following to the wire."

Although the embryo of the astronomically-rich All American Futurity might have been in the formative stages back then, Baby K's win at old Hollywood Park could have been a fertile seed.

"Good gosh, how racing has grown in New Mexico!" voiced McSpadden. "What does it cost to get a horse to the All American trials? Well, I can tell you it cost me \$100 to nominate and \$50 to run. Of course, the gross pot was only \$2500 and the winner's share was \$1900. But, man, that was nothing to sneeze at in those days!"

What happened to Baby K? "Oh, I ran her a few more times . . . even beat the Thoroughbred General Patton at Junction for \$5,000. I bred her but didn't get any good colts and finally woundup trading her back to Jim Derrick for a car." McSpadden had bought Baby K from Derrick as a yearling for \$200.

"I will say this," McSpadden added, "Baby K beat some good horses including Mamour. Derrick bought Mamou for \$2200 in Louisiana and later sold her to Dale Robertson for a bunch of money."

McSpadden was born and reared on a ranch near Alpine, Texas, and "grew up with horses." He purchased his first one, 'Blondie', when he was 19 years old. "She was a 7/8 Thoroughbred out of Jack Atkins and I ran her from 300 up to a half mile. It was mostly match races back then and I guess my first big win was when Blondie outran Dream Light, the Thoroughbred out of Kentucky."

The veteran horseman got into New Mexico racing after he moved to Artesia where he had bought a ranch. One of his early runners was Hickory Bill who he bought in partnership with Gene Benson. Another topnotcher was Wonder Lad.

"Wonder Lad was just an old feather-legged horse who liked to run. He held the half mile record at the State Fair for a long time," said McSpadden.

Although McSpadden didn't own her, his eyes lit up when he mentioned Miss Bank. "Finest horse I ever trained," he said.

"Miss Bank outran every horse that ever outran her, except Miss Princess, and that race was in the mud," he added. "She didn't have a fault at 12. We bred her to Worry Man and got Bankette and, of course, you know Bankette is the dam of Rebel Cause, which gets into some pretty high-powered blood."

Although McSpadden hasn't been in the racing business for several years, he had a dreamy look in his eyes when he spoke of his dispersal. "I had 13 proven race mares, including Flying Bob and My Texas Dandy breeding. At that time you could breed to Three Bars in Oklahoma for \$300. But I decided to get out of the business although I didn't give up the love for racing. Since I have moved to Ruidoso I go to the track every day. There is something about good running horses that just stirs a man up."

... and it has been men like Jack McSpadden who have stirred racing up. He ran horses down the roads and in the back country and hauled hundreds of miles to "match" when word got out about a good runner.

He can truly be classed as a pioneer in New Mexico horse racing!

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-Legislative Report- CONTINUED

The principal cause of the racing industry hassle, this session, was a bill introduced by the Administration (Governor) to strengthen the discretion of the Racing Commission over who shall own a New Mexico track and how many New Mexico tracks can be owned by any one group of stockholders. The fight boiled down to the view of the present Commission that it needs broader discretionary power over all phases of licensing and security on New Mexico tracks. The view of many members of the legislature was that the Commission already has sufficient power in these

areas, but needed some specific statutory direction as to how this power should be applied. Our Breeder's Association legislation was drawn into the argument over how the Racing Commission has performed, and since there was a feeling expressed in a House bill that the present Commission should be abolished and a new one appointed by the Governor, our "practical breeder" definition was viewed as an attempt to disqualify some of the present Commissioners from serving.

This assumption was untrue and invalid in view of the fact that the Commissioners involved

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stated in committee hearings that they could qualify under the new definition. The new definition being: "Practical breeder' means a person who has bred a dam owned by him and raised from birth at least one race horse registered with the New Mexico Horse Breeder's Association and which race horse has started on a New Mexico race track". The unamended definition bill (S.B. 387) received a favorable report out of the Senate Public Affairs Committee. After much consideration as to how the bill might limit the Governor's scope of selection for Racing

Commissioners, why it is necessary to have horse breeders at all on the Commission, and an attempt to amend the bill to enlarge the Commission to seven members with no proportionate increase in the number of horse breeders, this bill was subjected to a great deal of debate, on the Senate floor, relating mostly to political implication regarding the present Commission. As a consequence, the bill was finally tabled indefinitely by a tie vote, broken by the Lt. Governor. This action had the effect of killing the bill. The only option left at this point was to amend the live bill, relating to the

power of the Commission, to include the definition of "practical breeder". This attempt was made on the House floor and failed. During this activity, it was necessary to keep up with hearings on the Racing Commission powers bills because there was a concerted effort made to amend the present statute and remove the stipulation that horse breeders be represented on the Racing Commission. This attempt was repeatedly thwarted and the final version maintained the horse breeders position on the Commission. The bill to increase the breeder's award fund was buried in the morass of finance legislation involved in this session, and was not scheduled for hearing due to time limitation and the complications involved with other pending racing legislation. However, it was determined that a better approach would be to introduce this proposal as a direct line item appropriation in next year's fiscal session.

Breeder vs. amended statute

The most significant result of this session of the Legislature was of the much amended Commission powers bill (Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 135). As it went to the Governor, this bill now empowers the Racing Commission to limit the ownership, of any one group, to two tracks in New Mexico, protects the issuance of passes by the members of the Racing Commission, prohibits members of the Racing Commission from racing their horses on a New Mexico track, provides the Racing Commission with the discretion as to whether or not a

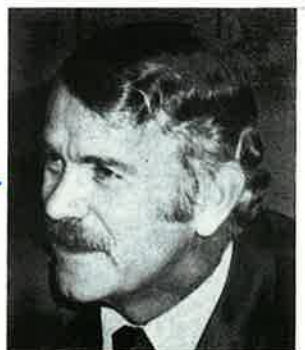
